1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

Established on 14th July 2014, Government General Degree College, Salboni, stands as a testament to the Government of West Bengal's commitment to enhancing educational opportunities in the Jangalmahal area, which had suffered from socio-political unrest for decades. The institute, affiliated to Vidyasagar University, Midnapore, commenced its first academic session in 2014, promising to cater to the needs of the local community. As a general degree college, we offer a diverse range of courses in both B.A. and B.Sc. programmes, providing options for Honours and General streams. Apart from the curricular aspects, our institute has been continuously working on uplift of the socio-economically underprivileged communities of the Salboni block, particularly the area surrounding Pirakata, by means of educating our students. Our teachers, highly qualified scholars of their respective fields, attends the faculty induction programmes and subject refreshers courses regularly. They are equipped with the up-to-date teaching methodologies, attuned to the needs of the changing times and sensitize the students accordingly.

Located beside the Midnapore-Lalgarh Road and nestled in the serene hamlet of Kayma, our college is surrounded by lush forests brimming with towering Sal, Teak, Eucalyptus, and Mahua trees. Sprawling over 5 acres of land, our picturesque campus features a well-equipped academic building, a large playground, several gardens, and a vibrant student community center with separate common rooms for boys and girls, a gymnasium, and more. At Government General Degree College, Salboni, we are dedicated to fostering an environment of academic excellence and personal growth, continuing our commitment to serving the educational needs of our community for many years to come. With a decade now behind us, we are proud to be able to continue fulfilling our pledge in both letter and spirit.

Institutional Weakness

- The institute is located in a very remote village area. So, the communication is very poor. Not sufficient transport facilities available for teachers & students
- Infrastructural management has procedural delays
- Limited recurring funds allotted for the institution constrain resources needed for operational expenses, instrument AMC, hiring casual staff, and other necessities of the establishment.
- As a fully government-funded institution, the college relies entirely on the Public Works Department (PWD) for all construction and renovation-related civil and electrical works. This dependency complicates maintenance and monitoring efforts.
- Due to limited funding, there is minimal provision for organizing seminars.
- The non-recruitment of laboratory assistants has deprived the Science Departments which has also adversely affected the office.
- Due to a lack of funds, the library does not have an adequate number of quality books
- Availability of refreshments is inadequate due to remote location
- Dropouts of students are very high due to various socio-economic & cultural issues
- Dropout of female students for getting married is a serious matter of concern
- Non-availability of residential quarters for Teaching or non-teaching staff

Institutional Challenge

- As a government college, the institution frequently encounters procedural delays due to the administrative complexities of the government. While unintentional, these delays pose recurrent obstacles.
- The institution faces challenges due to inadequate government funding, resulting in lack of developments of proper infrastructure.

- Lack of interest among students to pursue research/teaching as career.
- There is limited opportunity to implement innovative teaching-learning techniques due to the strict constraints of completing the syllabus within the short academic schedule under semester system mandated by the affiliating University.
- Difficulty to attract bright students from urban schools for admission because of the remote location of the institutes
- Paucity of time for the teachers for research work
- Keeping pace with the rapid changes in higher education & upgradation of infrastructure
- Providing resources for marginalized students
- Lack of standards for quality control, development of e-resources, and e-content delivery
- Ensuring digital equity is crucial in digital learning and there is high percentage of digital divide
- Distribution of ICT Infrastructure across disciplines
- Strengthening the skills & adaptability of the online platform for both teachers & students

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

Government General Degree College Salboni is committed to ensure optimal realisation of curricular aspects. In the matters of curricular planning and implementation, the college completely adheres to the syllabi structured by the affiliated university. Effective curriculum delivery is secured through well-maintained and documented processes like preparing academic calendar, centralised and departmental class routines, conducting continuous evaluation and adopting diverse teaching mechanisms. Currently, the institution is offering 11 (4 years) Honours/Honours with research courses and 2 (3 years) multi-disciplinary programs under CCFUP-NEP, 2020 and 11 Honours and General courses under CBCS curriculum of the Vidyasagar University. In the beginning of each session an academic calendar, in accordance with the university's academic calendar is prepared for both odd and even semester. For deliberation of lectures along with chalk-and talk method, ICT tools are used. Continuous internal evaluation through home assignments, presentations and class tests is maintained. As per university guidelines internal assessments are meticulously conducted by individual departments as well as centralised internal examination sub-committee as per requirement.

In addition, as part of academic flexibility, several departments conduct a number of Add-On/Certificate/Value-Added Courses with satisfactory response from the students. The courses are designed to enhance skill and expertise in students which are not part of the syllabi. In the last five years the college has successfully completed 17 Value-added courses with atleast one course offered by each department. Regarding curriculum enrichment the institution integrates cross-cutting issues relevant to professional ethics, gender, human values and environment and sustainability within the premise of the prescribed curriculum. In the last completed academic session an average of 28% of total students enrolled have successfully completed curriculum-directed project/fieldwork addressing these issues. Beyond the curriculum the institution conducts webinars, special talks, awareness drives, professional skill-oriented programmes to enrich students on such matters. The NSS unit and other cells and sub-committees are geared towards organising initiatives for the holistic development and well-being of the students.

The institution has a robust feedback mechanism led by an active IQAC. Feedback regarding academicmatters, curricular framework, infrastructure are obtained from all stakeholders. The feedback is then analysed, reported and accordingly action is taken.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

The college ensures a transparent and merit-based online admission process, managing around 1200 applications annually for honours and general / MDP courses, with all information available on the college website. Notifications are also sent to nearby schools for wider reach.

With an enrolment rate of 58.99%, the process is inclusive, highlighted by the high admission rate of 85.25% from the Reserved Category.

At the beginning of every academic session, an orientation program is conducted for new students.

Student mentoring is offered, with mentors providing counselling on academic issues.

The college uses diverse student-centric methodologies for experiential learning such as debates, quizzes, wall magazine preparation, poster presentation, students' seminars, online extension lectures etc.

Some of our departments conduct educational excursions to create a engaging learning environment.

Faculty members combine traditional teaching with dynamic methods, utilizing audio-visual and ICT-enabled aids. Engaging Power Points presentations enhance students' understanding.

Tutorial & Remedial Classes are conducted on a regular basis.

During the challenging period of the pandemic, all teachers actively engaged in online teaching using various online platforms especially Google Meets. Communication through WhatsApp groups has been maintained.

The college has a dedicated team of 30 permanent teaching faculties, including 12 with Ph.D. degrees and 8 with M.Phil. degrees. All teachers are recruited through Public Service Commission, West Bengal.

The Student-Teacher ratio for the current academic session 2023-24 is 23.67:1.

The institution prioritizes transparent communication about the evaluation process through the offline/online notices and university circulars.

Strictly adhering to university regulations, continuous assessment involves assignments, project work, quizzes,

and internal tests, promotes student awareness and engagement in their academic progress.

The syllabi, Programme and course outcomes of all programmes are available on the college website and student assessments are based on these.

A feedback mechanism provides valuable insights for teaching faculty to gauge the depth of their students' understanding of academic matters.

The overall pass percentage of our outgoing students at the University exams is impressive with a 98.04% pass rate for last 5 years (2019-23) across all streams.

Research, Innovations and Extension

The college has embarked on a novel journey for the creation and transfer of knowledge. The courses cover the Indian Knowledge System, encompassing the flavours of arts, literature and pure science. The campus features laboratories equipped with advanced instruments, complemented by 24-hour internet access for faculty members. The Tribal Museum and Center for Studies of Tribal Development on campus plays a pivotal role in transferring knowledge across generations, contributing to a holistic educational experience at the institution.

Faculties have contributed significantly to academic literature with numerous publications in quality-indexed journals and participate in conferences, workshops and seminars to exchange their knowledge and collaborate. A faculty has successfully secured the provision of seed money for Unnat Bharat Abhiyan (UBA) projects. The research projects in the department of physics exemplify the institution's commitment to research. One faculty member of chemistry has secured patent conferring exclusive legal rights for his invention.

Engagement in various social initiatives like health camps, social and academic programs, and environmental awareness campaigns; implementation of community development projects in collaboration with local government bodies through UBA and various awareness programs in different villages are part of the regular extension activities of our college.

Active participation of students in various awareness programs, adult literacy programs and special lectures through the NSS unit fosters a sense of social responsibility and leadership. The NSS unit organizes different volunteer programs and various extension activities where students contribute to societal development. Understanding the fact that the welfare of an individual is not a discrete phenomenon but rather stands on the foundation of the welfare of society, community, and environment as a whole, the NSS unit is living and reliving its motto, which is '*Not Me, But You*'.

MoUs with different institutions foster knowledge transfer and expose students to diverse career opportunities. Some departments also organize educational excursions to make the students familiar with the experience of field research. Student Magazine marks a significant milestone, celebrating the creativity, talent, and voice of the student body.

Proactive approach of faculty members in research, innovation and extension activities highlights their dedication to academic excellence and societal contribution.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

Government General Degree College Salboni offers a comprehensive educational environment across its 5-acre campus, catering to both students and staff with excellent facilities. The college supports academic excellence through 11 undergraduate departments, 29 skilled faculty members along with librarian, and a blend of traditional and modern teaching methods, including online resources.

Physical fitness is prioritized with a spacious playground, a well-equipped gymnasium, yoga hall etc.

The Central Library of college has a collection of over 5,800 books and a reading room equipped with 6 computers, to support extensive academic research and study. Hands-on learning is facilitated by seven (07) science laboratories which include two (02) computer laboratories of Physics and Mathematics Department.

College provides various facilities like handrails, ramp, wheelchair and separate amenities for divyangjan. The campus also includes 2 separate common rooms for boys and girls with bathroom facilities and a first-aid centre for immediate medical support. A zero-tolerance policy for ragging and sexual harassment is strictly enforced to ensure a safe environment. College has a well equipped seminar hall for organizing variety of cultural activities, including dance, music, debates, and quizzes.

The college is equipped with robust IT facilities and provides 37 desktops, 04 laptops and complemented by 20 printers, scanners, 5 Xerox machines for printing and copying. Power backup is ensured with 1 diesel generator and 11 inverters with batteries. The college has two ICT enable classrooms and one portable projector for audio-visual learning. There are 28 CCTV cameras across the campus for security. The Wi-Fi network offers strong bandwidth, with download speeds of 75.04 Mbps and upload speeds of 73.57 Mbps. Overall, the college is committed to green computing practices by promoting email or any other electronic apps use to reduce paper consumption and ensuring that all electronic equipment is turned off when not in use.

Student Support and Progression

Our institution is steadfastly committed towards the support of the students and their progression in personal, professional and social life. More than seventy percent students of GGDC Salboni have been benefitted by various scholarships such as SVMCM, OASIS, Nabanna, Kanyashree (K1 & K2) and National Scholarship in the last five years. These scholarships are generously funded by Govt. of W.B. and Govt. of India.

The institute proactively undertakes skill development programs that cover Soft Skills (Special Lecture on "Human Values and Ethics"), Language and Communication abilities (Value Added Course on "English" and "Spoken Sanskrit"), Life Skills ("Self-Defence Training Programmes", "March-Past Training Programmes", "International Yoga-Day Celebration") and also training programmes on Computing and ICT Skills.

The Career Counselling and Placement Cell of the college organized several awareness programmes on employment opportunities in govt. and private sectors. Many experts from different organizations delivered informative sessions on diverse career paths, covering new industry trends and necessary job market skills. To boost employability of students, the Career Counselling and Placement Cell of GGDC Salboni has collaborated with O2 Academia, Midnapore to conduct several free Mock Test to prepare them for Govt. and Private recruitment processes. Almost 550 students have participated in the Career Counselling programmes in the last five years.

The institute has established mechanisms for submission of online/offline students' grievances including those

involving ragging and sexual harassment. Grievance Redressal sub-committee examines the grievance thoroughly and works to resolve the issue in a fair and impartial manner.

Six students have been placed and 77 students have successfully progressed to higher study over the last five years. Furthermore, in the same time frame, one student has passed the UGC-NET examination.

The institution's students enthusiastically and diversely demonstrated their talents by actively participating in over 100 sports and cultural events in the last five years.

The Alumni Association of Government General Degree College Salboni has been formed in 2024 through a resolution taken by the Alumni Committee. The process of registering the Alumni association has started.

Governance, Leadership and Management

A good governance, leadership, and management ensure a college runs proficiently, maintains academic standards, and provides a benign learning environment towards the pursuit of higher education. The vision of this institution is to make education accessible to the entire aspiring mind and liberate every soul from the constraints of ignorance. Being a Government institution, the college operates under the direct supervision of the Higher Education Department, Government of West Bengal. All the orders from the Higher Education Department has been implemented by the OIC of the institution in consultation with Teachers' council, IQAC Coordinator, conveners of various sub-committees, HOD of academic Departments and non-teaching staff. All processes related to appointments, confirmations, promotions, and transfers of the Principal, teaching, and non-teaching staff are centrally managed by the Higher Education Department.

The college has successfully implemented e-governance in various domains, including administration, finance and accounts, student admission and support, scholarship, grievance redressal and examination processes. The college authority has also conducted financial audit through external auditing agency headed by a chartered accountant to ensure transparency in financial matter.

As per the norms laid down by the Government of West Bengal, faculty members of the college submit their Self Appraisal Report (SAR) to the Officer-in-Charge through IFMS. The Officer-in-Charge provides comments and forwards the SAR to the Director of Public Instruction, and subsequently, it is sent to the Principal Secretary, Higher Education Department for approval.

The Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) of the college actively promotes measures aimed at enhancing institutional functioning and ensuring internal quality. IQAC conduct regular meeting to review teaching-learning process and overall quality improvement of the institution. IQAC encourage faculty members for participating in faculty induction program (FIP), Refreshers course (RC) in regular basis. The IQAC takes initiative for promotion of faculty members under Career Advancement Scheme (CAS) and resolves the matters timely through the assistance of the OIC. The IQAC has also implemented various feedback system. The cell analyzes the feedbacks in regular basis and prepares action taken report to ensure quality of the institution.

Institutional Values and Best Practices

The institution has implemented several measures to promote gender equity over the last five years. These include a dedicated female students' common room, a lady attendant (matron), extensive CCTV surveillance,

security guards, student ID cards, a female-managed help desk, a displayed helpline, and committees for internal complaints, anti-ragging, and discipline. Additionally, special gym sessions, self-defence, and martial arts training are provided for female students. The Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) and Gender Sensitization sub-committee initiated a gender audit and measures for promoting gender equity and sensitization from the academic session 2022–23.

The institution has installed bio-degradable and non-biodegradable waste management boxes, chemical waste management systems, and a rainwater harvesting system as an initiative for an eco-friendly and healthy campus. Various programs have been organized, such as tree plantations, campus cleaning under Swachh Bharat Abhiyaan, awareness on Tobacco-free Campus and Plastic-free campus, herbal garden plantations and many more on campus and beyond the campus. Awareness banners have been displayed throughout the campus and a policy making every Thursday 'No Vehicle Day' has also been implemented by the college authority as a step towards a pollution-free campus.

Quality audit on environment has been conducted by the efficient audit team from Vidyasagar University, Paschim Medinipur for the 2023-24 session.

Our institute takes various initiatives in providing an inclusive environment for SC, ST, and girl students, observing various significant days such as Students Week, Republic Day, Independence Day, International Mother Language Day, International Women's Day, Teacher's Day, and the birthdays of Rabindranath Tagore and Ishwar Chandra Vidyasagar. Annual sports and cultural programs are also organized each year.

The Institution has adopted two best practices such as proactive health culture and the promotion and conservation of indigenous culture. During the last five years, three health-related camps such as the COVID-19 vaccination camp, eye screening camp and thalassemia screening camp have been organized. A centre of studies for Tribal development has been set up for the promotion of indigenous culture. The institution's distinctiveness lies in the holistic development of students by addressing Sustainable Development Goals.

Institutional preparedness for NEP

1. Multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary:

The NEP 2020 provides a comprehensive framework for every level of education - primary, secondary, higher education, and vocational training education in both urban and rural areas of India. NEP 2020

	proposes several reforms in higher education, including the establishment of a single regulator, a multidisciplinary approach, flexibility in curriculum, and increased use of technology. It aims to increase the Gross Enrollment Ratio (GER) in higher education and promote research and innovation. Government General Degree College Salboni uses (a) a teaching strategy that includes each student's potential through sensitization of students and parents. (b) Departments of our college have made "elective papers" available to students in all disciplines. (c) Interdisciplinary subjects were encouraged for students to choose to help them to acquire knowledge across the courses. (d) The college also provides value-based education, environmental education, and community engagement and services through NSS. (e) Departments arrange popular lectures to provide diversity among courses. (f) Individual Departments, IQAC and different cells of the college arrange regular webinars, seminars, and awareness programs in different diverse fields.
2. Academic bank of credits (ABC):	The State Government and the affiliating University has addressed the Road-Map for NEP 2020. As a part of that all the students (366 in nos.) of Government General Degree College Salboni enrolled under NEP have ABC id.
3. Skill development:	The policy emphasizes the integration of skill development and vocational education into the mainstream curriculum. NEP 2020 seeks to bridge the gap between education and employability by providing students with practical skills and hands-on training aligned with industry requirements. The affiliated university has tailored its curriculum in light of the growing need for skilled workers in both the public and commercial sectors. There are many courses featured in the curriculum that are skill- oriented. The current imperative is to generate a young generation with degrees in their chosen fields and extra training programs that will enable them to launch their entrepreneurship after graduating from college. Other effective methods used by the institution for skill development include scientific workshops, sports competitions, etc. The syllabus of each subject is structured in such a way that students are required to complete application-oriented compulsory modules ('Skill Enhancement Courses'

	in Semesters 3 and 4), which relate to skill development, problem-solving, and analytical thinking, all of which are essential. Additionally, the college has set up a number of 'Add-on Courses' that might provide students with an edge in the fiercely competitive job market by giving them access to knowledge and abilities that they would not otherwise be able to acquire through the regular curriculum.
4. Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course):	The college attempts to elevate these disciplines by offering four languages in its undergraduate programs: English, Bengali, Sanskrit, and Santali. Philosophy Political science, History and Sociology are also offered as major courses to instill a sense of national integration, passion for art and culture, respect for women's community, and civic consciousness among the student body. Two languages, Sanskrit and Santali, and Philosophy are taught to ensure proper integration of Indian knowledge.
5. Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):	The integration of OBE within the NEP 2020 framework is poised to significantly elevate the quality of higher education in India. As educators and institutions adapt to this new paradigm, the focus on outcomes rather than inputs promises to better prepare students for the complexities of the modern world. To implement the spirit of NEP, the syllabus of every course has been nurtured with care for macroeconomic and societal needs at large. The initiative to change the curriculum toward OBE began with the implementation of the CBCS system. In our plan of action and in providing 'Generic Electives', 'Skill Enhanced Courses' and 'Discipline Specific Electives' we have taken great effort to give courses to students with the specific purpose of growing skills or gaining knowledge. By the end of the course, students should have completed the aim. All courses are taught with the cognitive capacities of remembering, understanding, applying, analyzing, evaluating and creating as their primary learning objectives. In addition to domain-specific knowledge, learning outcomes at all levels guarantee social responsibility, morality and entrepreneurial abilities so that students actively contribute to the country's economic, environmental, and social well- being. The courses are designed to attain the promised outcomes in respective programmes. (a)

	Students are expected to have logical thought processes in a range of social, historical, scientific, economic, ideological and philosophical traditions after finishing their selected programme. (b) The programmes also enable graduates to compete in numerous competitive examinations or pursue the higher education of their choice. (c) All the ignited minds, are able to consider and take action on a variety of issues affecting human life to improve this world. (d) Students are urged to have a rational, scientific mindset and approach, especially those studying the sciences.
6. Distance education/online education:	It has been observed that some of the primary components of NEP 2020 are 'Technology in Education' and 'Digital Education'. The college has long thought that integrating ICT into education might open the door to a new paradigm and offer a better platform for educating today's youth. Information into individual points:

- 1. Adherence to University Syllabus: Our college is a Constituent College affiliated with Vidyasagar University; hence, our institution operates within the framework set by the university for undergraduate courses. We strictly follow the syllabus determined by the University, ensuring a comprehensive education for students.
- 2. **Implementation and Dissemination of Curriculum:** We prioritize effective implementation and dissemination of the curriculum, closely following the Academic Calendar established by Vidyasagar University. Additionally, we incorporate unique extracurricular activities to enhance the college experience. Also, Curriculum dissemination at the departmental level is carefully strategized to optimize learning outcomes. We offer extra classes for students who require additional support, and Tutorial classes supplement regular coursework.
- 3. Academic Planning and Routine Structure: Our institute ensures balanced syllabus coverage and timely completion, aligning with the academic calendar. A centralized Master Routine and detailed Departmental Time-Tables facilitate smooth curriculum delivery. The Routine Sub-Committee, overseen by the Teachers' Council, designs the Central Routine for Arts and Science departments. Before each academic session, faculty members devise departmental routines and distribute syllabi. Class durations meet UGC guidelines, and attendance records are meticulously maintained across all departments.
- 4. Adaptation to Pandemic Challenges: During the challenges posed by the pandemic, our institution swiftly transitioned to online classes and tests in compliance with government restrictions.
- 5. **Teaching Techniques**: We employ diverse teaching techniques, ranging from traditional chalkand-talk methods to modern ICT-enabled lecture delivery systems. These methods are designed to foster student engagement and interest in the learning process. Beside Regular teaching techniques, continuous evaluation is ingrained within our teaching methodology, incorporating various assessment methods such as class tests, home assignments, and presentations. These practices allow us to gauge students' academic progression throughout the year effectively.
- 6. Evaluation Process and Internal Assessment: Evaluation is an ongoing process that includes Internal Assessment and End Semester Examinations per University guidelines, ensuring comprehensive student performance assessment. Each paper allocates 15 marks for Internal Assessment, 20% of the total marks, with 10 marks for internal assessments and 5 for class attendance. These assessments are mandatory and integral to the Choice Based Credit System implemented in 2018 per Vidyasagar University regulations. The College Internal Assessment Sub-Committee oversees internal exams, ensuring compliance with university deadlines.

- 7. Centralized Exam Administration: To ensure fair and efficient conduct of exams, the College Internal Examination Sub-Committee, operating under the Teachers' Council, arranges centralized examinations. Our institution rigorously adheres to university-set deadlines for completing internal assessments each semester. Additionally, the End Semester Examinations are centrally coordinated through University Examination Sub Committee under the Teachers' Council for this purpose.
- 8. **Inputting Assessment Marks and Responsibility of ENVS Sub-committee:** Departments are tasked with the responsibility to upload Internal and continuous Assessment marks into the University portal. This decentralized approach ensures timely submission and accuracy of assessment records. Additionally, The ENVS Sub-committee maintains and uploads evaluation records for the Environmental Studies paper across all Honors/Core and General/Generic Elective Courses.

Response:

Government General Degree College Salboni is committed to inculcate the essential elements of Gender, Human Values, Environment and Sustainability and Professional Ethics in all aspects of institutional activity. From the fundamental responsibility of teaching to organizing various student-centric learning programmes the college lays emphasis on these cross-cutting issues. The academic curriculum devised by Vidyasagar University is followed by all colleges under its purview. Individual colleges do not have much scope for altering or adding to the syllabi. However, it is fortunate that the syllabi of various subjects include the dissemination of these ideals. The teaching faculty of the college ensures that in imparting education these objectives are fulfilled.

Almost all subjects offered in the college at present cater to the realization of one or more of the mentioned ideals. Both the syllabus pattern i.e. C.B.C.S. and CCFUP-NEP have good representation of these. Environmental Studies (ENVS) have been consistently provided as a compulsory course for all students irrespective of the choice of their programmes under study. Along with theoretical portion in the

ENVS course, the preparation and submission of a project on any environment and sustainability-based topic is mandatory. Under the able and proficient guidance of supervisors, students of every session enthusiastically engage in it. The language subjects of Bengali, English and Sanskrit have significant portions addressing human values, gender, environment and the like. The syllabi of English offer courses on soft-skills and other professional necessities. Humanities subjects like Philosophy, History and Sociology deliver foundational as well as applied aspects on gender and human values in particular. Subjects under the science faculty, Physics and Chemistry have relevant sections on environment and sustainability. Most importantly, along with classroom and text-based learning the students have ample scope of imbibing these ideals through dissertations and fieldwork that are conducted by all departments as part of the curriculum.

At the institutional level, the approach in planning and implementation of various academic activities reflect the importance given to these cross-cutting issues. The college arranges talks and lectures specific on these topics. Even in the online mode various departments and sub-committees have organized successful webinars on human values, ethics and gender. In celebrating diverse events there is always an attempt to address these issues. Special talk on gender have been arranged. The college has made special provisions for girl students to tackle women-oriented issues. Considering the socio-economic specificities of the target student community of the college provisions are geared to restrict drop-outs specially among female students.

The NSS unit of the college is active in incorporating the essential ideals particularly on environment and sustainability. Repeated sessions are held on keeping the campus clean, spreading awareness on sustainability and also addressing gender issues like education before marriage and others.

The Institution has been successful in organizing tree plantation and maintenance drives. Rain water harvesting has been possible within the campus. Regular green audits are conducted to maintain the standards.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1

Mechanism of internal/ external assessment is transparent and the grievance redressal system is time- bound and efficient

Response:

Being affiliated to Vidyasagar University, Government General Degree College Salboni abides by the rules and regulations formulated by the University regarding curriculum, examinations, and assessment.

Our college uses the Choice-Based Credit System (CBCS) to ensure fair evaluation of all students. The External Examination Sub-Committee conducts university exams at the end of each semester, requiring a minimum 75% attendance. The university administers semester exams, with most faculty members involved in evaluating students through question framing, moderation, and assessment. Additionally, the college also serves as an examination centre.

We also conduct internal assessments following the CBCS pattern, in addition to university exams.Our college's assessment process is continuous and transparent. The college determines marks for internal assessments, while the university assesses students on their final exams. For core courses, 10 marks are allocated for internal assessments, and 5 marks for skill enhancement courses. Additionally,5 marks are awarded based on attendance records kept by teachers.

The schedule of the internal assessments are prepared by the concerned departments, barring certain papers like 1st semester English AECC core (compulsory for B.A. general students), BNGMAE and 3rd semester general English language core ENGLCC, which is conducted centrally by the College Internal Assessment Sub-Committee.

Students are notified about internal assessments at least a week in advance through various channels: college website, notice boards, intimations in class and in WhatsApp groups by professors.

During the COVID-19 pandemic, we shifted to online assessments. Teachers used WhatsApp groups to notify students of internal assessments during the 2020-21 and 2021-22 (partly) academic sessions. Students submitted scanned answer scripts via email and received questions digitally.

During the pandemic, colleges administered online end-of-semester exams. Despite technical issues, most students successfully submitted their answers via email. The External Examination Sub-Committee ensured a smooth process. Students without internet access could drop off their scripts in person at the college drop-box, following COVID-19 guidelines.

Evaluation does not stop with assessments. If a student struggles, we offer extra help through remedial classes and tutorials. Teachers also assign classroom exams and homework to reinforce learning and provide targeted support whenever needed.

In case of issues with the evaluation process, a student can go to the Student discipline, Grievance and anti-ragging Sub-committee which forwards it to the College Internal Assessment Sub-Committee, which will investigate and resolve the issue promptly. While we haven't had any major issues reported so far, having this system in place ensures that concerns are addressed quickly and efficiently.

Our college offers a comprehensive learning experience with diverse activities that enrich students' education, including field studies, poster presentations, seminars, and practical classes and lab work. These activities foster active learning, creativity, and critical thinking, preparing students for academic success and future careers.

The college evaluates students beyond test scores, focusing on their learning journey and providing continuous support. It prioritizes transparency, holistic learning, and a Grievance Redressal System to ensure every student's voice is heard and valued. The goal is to build a community where every student can succeed and thrive.

Response:

The Central Library was established in the year 2014 at the time of the inception of the college itself. The college possesses a 2756 sq. ft. well-furnished, automated, open access central library with more than 5800 books, magazines and weekly and daily newspapers. There is an e-learning room and separate reading section for teachers and students with 56 seats capacity.

Library Management Software: The efficient cataloguing, circulation, and user management at library are ensured through the utilization of cloud-based **e-Granthalaya** (version 4.0, Rel. 20) developed by NIC.

Library Orientation Programme: This program provides orientation to every student, acquainting them with both offline and online library access systems.

CCTV Surveillance: A total of 4 CCTVs are installed within the central library, which also serve for the purpose of safeguarding books and antitheft drives.

NDLI Club: Students and faculties can access texts and reading materials from National Digital Library and participate in different programs through NDLI Club.

Question Bank and Syllabus: Previous years' question papers and syllabi are available at the college library website in digitised form.

Remote Access to Library: Students and staff have the convenience of remote access to bibliographic sources via OPAC and various e-resources.

Seminar Library: With a considerable collection of books, a departmental seminar library developed, which can be easily accessed by the students.

Digital Document Delivery Service: Introduced a need-based digital document and photocopy delivery service via WhatsApp and email to enhance accessibility.

Open Educational Resources: Library listing teaching and learning materials that are freely available online for everyone to use.

Footfall at the Library: The college library recorded a total footfall of 2672 users over the past year.

Virtual Book Display: Virtual Book Display is an innovative initiative designed to enhance student

engagement with library resources in a digital format.

6.3 Faculty Empowerment Strategies

6.3.1

The institution has performance appraisal system, effective welfare measures for teaching and non-teaching staff and avenues for career development/progression

Response:

The Government of West Bengal's Higher Education Department oversees Government General Degree College Salboni. Benefits designated for legitimate government employees are enjoyed by both teaching and non-teaching personnel.

West Bengal Health Scheme (WBHS):

Eligibility for WBHS - All teaching staff and only permanent non-teaching staff can enroll in WBHS.

WBHS is managed by the Medical Cell under the Finance Department, Government of West Bengal, in consultation with the Health and Family Welfare Department (See G.O. No. 3472-F dated 11.05.2009).

Benefits of WBHS:

Provides an insurance policy for medical treatment against any kind of disease. Employees can receive medical treatment from Government Hospitals, Nursing Homes, and Medical Institutions. Access to low-cost medical diagnostics at WBHS-empanelled diagnostic centers.

Indoor Treatment Facilities:

Cashless Facility:

Employees can avail cashless IPD treatment in private empanelled hospitals up to Rs. 1,50,000 (See G.O. No. 73-F(MED)WB dated 28.04.2022).

Reimbursement Facility:

For treatment costs exceeding Rs. 1,50,000, employees can apply for reimbursement through the online WBHS portal.

Furthermore, the government has introduced a Self Appraisal Report (SAR) for teaching faculty members, which is to be submitted through WBIFMS. This SAR evaluates the performance, character, conduct, and qualities of each faculty member within the institution. The SAR process follows a hierarchical structure involving the Reporting Officer, Reviewing Officer, and Accepting Authority.

For non-teaching staff, appraisals are forwarded to higher authorities during their confirmation and promotion processes.

It's worth noting that the institution also values student feedback, which plays a significant role. Students from each department evaluate teaching activities and methods from their perspectives, providing valuable insights. Faculty members at our institution continually refine their teaching methodologies based on these evaluations.

Welfare Measures for Teaching and Non-Teaching Staff:

Teaching Staff:

Teaching staff benefit from various welfare measures including GPF, Group Insurance, Medical Leave, Maternity Leave, and CCL (Child Care Leave).

6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

6.4.1

Institution has strategies for mobilization and optimal utilization of resources and funds from various sources (government/ nongovernment organizations) and it conducts financial audits regularly (internal and external)

Response:

Government General Degree College Salboni operates under the oversight and financial support of the Higher Education Department, Government of West Bengal. Each year, we submit our proposed annual budget to this department, covering salaries and other expenses. For the acquisition of equipment, books, chemicals, and other contingent items, we submit requisition with substantiating documents to the Higher Education Department.

The Government authorities allocate funds for salaries and other developmental purposes through a centrally managed Human Resource Management System (HRMS) that integrates with the Integrated Financial Management System (IFMS) for financial transactions. The Teachers' Council of our college has established sub-committees, including the Central Purchase Committee and the Tender Committee, to handle the process of issuing paper tenders or e-tenders in accordance with government regulations. These committees compare quotations and place orders with recognized vendors using college order books, in consultation with the Heads of Departments.

Upon receiving the items, we record them in the departmental stock books and submit the corresponding bills to the college office for electronic payment processing via IFMS. At the end of each financial year, we ensure that all allocated funds are utilized and submit utilization certificates either offline or online to the Government of West Bengal.

As a government institution, our accounts are subject to auditing by the Accountant General's Office (AGE) of the Government of West Bengal. Apart from that, to ensure financial accountability, we have also engaged a well-known chartered accounting firm for an external audit and the report is enclosed with this document.

Furthermore, the financial statements for the fiscal years 2018-19, 2019-20, 2020-21, 2021-22, 2022-23 and 2023-24 have been audited by a chartered accountant firm in Kolkata, West Bengal. All departmental and office stock books are also subjected to regular internal audits.

In addition to the regular audits, we are proud to manage several extramural research projects, primarily funded by the Science and Technology Department, Government of West Bengal. For these projects, the principal investigators, one of our faculty members regularly submit audited expenditure statements through chartered accountant firms.

It reviews teaching learning process, structures & methodologies of operations and learning outcomes at periodic intervals and records the incremental improvement in various activities

Response:

The Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) plays a pivotal role in quality assurance strategies and processes within educational institutions. Every educational institute should constitute IQAC, maintaining NAAC guidelines to ensure internal quality of the institute. The primary aim of IQAC formation is to develop a system for mindful, consistent and catalytic action to improve the academic and administrative performance of the institution and to promote measures for institutional functioning towards quality augmentation through the internalization of quality culture and best practices. The IQAC of Govt. General Degree College, Salboni has actively initiated a fruitful Teaching-Learning environment to monitor the quality of various academic and administrative activities. IQAC of the college meets regularly as per NAAC guidelines and takes up issues related to quality of the institution. To maintain the continuous improvement of the academic environment, IQAC inspires faculty members

to participate in orientation programs (OP), faculty induction program (FIP), and Refresher courses (RC). IQAC also insist faculty members to submit their promotion file under CAS timely and approves the file at the earliest possible time. The IQAC organizes different seminars, webinars throughout the year. On the occasion of completion of ten years of our institution, a student magazine named "Uttaran" has been published by seminar and publication sub-committee in collaboration with IQAC. The IQAC assists the Officer-in-Charge in framing out academic programs, infrastructural blueprints etc. IQAC adapts various best practices such as vaccination camp, Thalassemia screening camp, eye checkup, carrier counseling, student's credit card awareness program etc as a part of the student's week observation program. IQAC arrange induction program for first semester students to cater regarding CBCS and CCFUP-NEP curriculum. IQAC encourage NSS unit-1 of the college to carryout various program such as green campus initiatives, plastic free campus, yoga program, self-defense for women etc. Grievance Redressal cell of the college resolves the grievances timely. IQAC takes the various initiatives for upgradation of central library of the college such as library automation, OPAC, NDL club registration etc. As suggested by IQAC, a center of studies for tribal development has been formed by HOD, Santali Department to encourage the students from tribal community. A Tribal museum has also been setup under this center. IQAC encouraged various Departments to offer value added certificate course (VAC) for the students. To promote and enrich academic exchange IQAC take initiatives for memorandum of understanding (MOU) with various institutions. To increase student intake in higher education representative from our college visited nearby school and delivered lecture on NEP -2020. Thus, IQAC of the college is engaged in every aspect to improve overall quality of the institution.

To promote gender equity effectively, our college's Gender Sensitization Committee and IQAC have developed a comprehensive strategy. This includes organizing educational seminars and interactive sessions featuring experts on gender issues and legislation, such as workplace sexual harassment laws. Awareness campaigns are conducted through information dissemination and social media outreach, while gender studies are integrated into the curriculum, complemented by guest lectures and panel discussions. Support systems, including counseling services and faculty training, are established to handle gender-related issues sensitively. Student involvement is encouraged in leadership and outreach efforts, with ongoing evaluations and transparent reporting to refine and measure the impact of these initiatives, fostering a culture of respect and equality throughout the college.

From the academic session 2022-23, the College Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) and Gender Sensitization Committee have initiated a gender audit and measures for promoting gender equity and sensitization within the institution.

Facilities and provisions to ensure the safety and well-being of female students:

- 1. **Dedicated Female Students' Common Room:** A fully equipped common room is provided for female students to ensure their comfort and convenience.
- 2. Lady Attendant (Matron): A Lady Attendant is available in the girls' common room to offer support and address any concerns.
- 3. Extensive CCTV Surveillance: The campus is monitored by 32 HD CCTV cameras strategically placed to enhance security and ensure a safe environment.
- 4. **Security Guards:** Security personnel are stationed at the college gates and additional key locations across the campus to maintain a vigilant security presence.
- 5. **Student ID Cards:** Issued to all students to prevent unauthorized access and ensure only authorized individuals are on campus.
- 6. **Female-Managed Help Desk:** Managed by a female employee, the Help Desk offers a supportive point of contact for female students.
- 7. **Helpline Displayed:** A dedicated helpline for female students is prominently displayed across the campus and on the college website.
- 8. **Internal Complaints Committee:** This committee handles grievances and complaints related to issues such as harassment and discrimination.
- 9. **Prevention of Sexual Harassment Cell:** This cell addresses and resolves cases of sexual harassment effectively and confidentially.

- 10. Anti-Ragging Committee: Operational to prevent and address incidents of ragging, ensuring a respectful environment.
- 11. **Discipline Committee:** Responsible for upholding student safety and addressing disciplinary issues fairly.
- 12. **Special Gym Sessions for Female Students:** Special gym sessions are arranged under supervision to promote physical fitness and security
- 13. Self-Defense and Martial Arts Training: Regular training programs equip female students with practical skills for personal safety and empowerment.

7.2.1

Describe two best practices successfully implemented by the Institution as per NAAC format provided in the Manual

Response:

Best Practice 1

Title: Proactive Health Culture

Objective: The primary objective of the "Proactive Health Culture" initiative undertaken by Government General Degree College, Salboni was to educate and assist students and the local community on critical health issues, focusing on the challenges presented by the COVID-19 pandemic. This initiative aimed to bridge the knowledge gap in modern health practices among the rural population, ensuring they have the necessary information and resources to safeguard their health.

Context: The college is situated in a rural area where most of the population, including the students, hails from nearby villages. These communities often lack access to accurate and timely health information, making them vulnerable to various health challenges. The onset of the COVID-19 pandemic further exacerbated these challenges, underscoring the urgent need for proactive measures to educate and protect the community. Understanding the importance of health education and preventive care, the college recognized its responsibility to step in and address these pressing issues.

The Practice:

Covid 19 Vaccination Camp:

As directed by the District Magistrate & Collector, Paschim Medinipur, Government General Degree College, Salboni organized a COVID-19 vaccination camp on 30th September, 1st October, 23rd, and 24th December 2021. A team from the Salboni Block Hospital administered the Covishield vaccine to 1,372 students in total, marking a significant contribution to public health and ensuring a safer campus environment.

Eye Screening Camp:

On 5th January 2023, the college's Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) collaborated with Midnapore Rotary Eye Hospital to host a free Eye Screening Camp. The camp served both students and local residents, providing spectacles at a nominal cost and offering free cataract surgeries to four elderly individuals.

Thalassemia Screening Camp:

Continuing its commitment to health, the IQAC also organized a Thalassemia Screening Camp on 4th January 2024. Blood samples from newly admitted students were tested by pathologists from Kharagpur SDH and BMOH Salboni. The initiative focused on early detection and prevention, and counseling the students as well as others.

Evidence of Success: The success of the "Proactive Health Culture" initiative is evident from the positive outcomes experienced by both the students and the local community. The vaccination camp successfully mitigated the spread of COVID-19 in the region, contributing to the health and safety of the population. The eye screening camp detected several cases of potential eye problems, enabling timely medical intervention. Similarly, the thalassemia screening camp identified carriers of the disorder, providing them with essential medical guidance and support.

Problems Encountered and Resources Required: The implementation of the health camps in a rural setting presented several challenges. One of the primary issues was the difficulty in transporting medical

equipment to the college, given the remote location. Additionally, the lack of awareness about health issues and preventive measures among students and villagers posed a significant challenge. Procuring and storing medical supplies in a rural environment was also a logistical hurdle that required careful planning and resource allocation. The limited availability of trained medical experts and support staff further complicated the execution of the health camps.

Best Practice 2

Title: Promotion and Conservation of Indigenous Culture

Objective: Government General Degree College, Salboni is committed to supporting the economically disadvantaged tribal communities in the remote areas of Jangalmahal. The college organizes festivals and cultural activities to celebrate indigenous traditions, works to strengthen traditional institutions, fosters social mindset development, and documents the rich cultural heritage of these tribal communities.

Context: Situated in a remote corner of West Bengal, our college serves a catchment area predominantly inhabited by socio-economically disadvantaged castes and tribes. The institution is driven by a vision to uplift the academic standards of students and improve the socio-economic conditions of the Jangalmahal area. The development of tribal communities is central to this vision, with initiatives aimed at preserving and promoting their unique cultural identities.

Practice:

Festivals and Cultural Activities: The college regularly organizes cultural programs where students perform traditional Santali dances accompanied by folk music instruments such as flutes, pipes, and drums. These events are held on campus during various cultural festivals, celebrating the vibrancy of indigenous traditions.

Strengthening Traditional Institutions: Faculty members actively participate as resource persons in initiatives across Paschim Medinipur, strengthening the traditional institutions of tribal communities. The Unnat Bharat Abhiyan (UBA) unit, NSS, and the Centre for Studies of Tribal Development are working closely with the community.

Social Mindset Development: A value-added course on the Santali Majhi System and Village Development has been introduced in the Santali Department to further integrate tribal knowledge into the academic curriculum.

Action Project on Environment Conservation: In 2024, the Centre for Studies of Tribal Development, in collaboration with the Environmental Studies Sub-Committee, launched an Action Project on Environment Conservation. This project focuses on promoting environmental awareness and sustainable practices within the tribal communities.

Documentation: The college undertakes extensive documentation of the life and culture of tribal people, ensuring that their heritage is preserved for future generations.

Museum: A dedicated museum on campus displays and preserves various traditional musical instruments and hunting tools, fostering interest in indigenous culture among students and visitors.

Evidence of Success: The College's initiatives to promote and conserve indigenous culture have significant success. The cultural programs have not only preserved traditional art forms but also instilled a sense of pride among the tribal students. The integration of tribal knowledge into the academic curriculum has enriched the educational experience. The environmental conservation project has raised awareness about the importance of sustainability, while the documentation efforts have ensured that the rich cultural heritage of the tribal communities is not lost. The museum serves as a tangible representation of this success, attracting interest and appreciation from many.

Challenges Encountered and Resources Required: Despite these successes, the college faces significant challenges due to a lack of funding, which affects various aspects of its programs, from academic initiatives to student support services. However, through strategic planning, proactive fundraising, community engagement, and cost optimization, the college strives to overcome these obstacles and continue to enrich cultural experiences for the students.

Holistic Development of the Students by addressing Sustainable Development Goals

The Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) are a set of 17 global objectives adopted by the United Nations in 2015 as part of the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development. These goals aim to tackle pressing global challenges, including poverty, inequality, climate change, environmental degradation, peace, and justice. Each goal is supported by specific targets to be achieved by 2030, providing a comprehensive framework for governments, businesses, and civil society to work collaboratively toward a sustainable future.

As a member of the United Nations, India is also committed to achieving these 17 SDGs, which encompass the socioeconomic and environmental dimensions of development, with a central focus on eradicating poverty in all its forms. To effectively achieve the SDGs, it is crucial to bring these goals into focus at the local level. The Ministry of Panchayati Raj of the Government of India has identified nine thematic areas under three broad categories—economic sustainability, social sustainability, and environmental sustainability—for the localization of the SDGs in Panchayats. These locally adaptable goals, as defined by the Ministry, are highly relevant to our institution as well.

Our college, inaugurated by the Hon'ble Chief Minister in 2014, was established with the primary aim of addressing the academic needs of economically disadvantaged and underprivileged students in the rural and backward areas of Paschim Medinipur, specifically in the Jangal Mahal region of West Bengal, which has experienced decades of deprivation. Most of our students come from low-income families residing in socioeconomically backward villages.

Recognizing that education is key to achieving sustainable development, we have undertaken the task of educating our students about sustainable living practices. This education will empower them to become **economically independent, socially aware, and environmentally conscious**. In alignment with the Ministry's three categories—economic sustainability, social sustainability, and environmental sustainability—we have integrated these themes into our several activities to inspire our students to embrace sustainable living practices and contribute meaningfully to their communities and beyond. Following is a report of our college's multiple activities organized under these three categories.

Economic Sustainability

- To alleviate the economic burden one has to bear for the pursuit of higher studies, our college has stipulated the fee-structure for the students at the bare minimum. We encourage students coming from various socio-economic background to follow their ambitions and fulfil their dreams by making several Government sponsored scholarships and students welfare schemes widely known and easily accessible to them.
- The college organizes career counselling programmes for the students to be economically independent and self-sufficient at regular intervals. We have a designated Career Counselling Sub-committee which conducts and oversees these events. The committee also invites extramural agencies to conduct career counselling programmes, classes and mock-tests on competitive examinations and guidance on entrepreneurship.
- The NSS unit, UBA unit and the Centre for Studies of Tribal Development of our college have conducted, with the help of local communities, many outreach programmes to spread the awareness about the goals of economic sustainability in the society at large and help the community to be economically self-sufficient.

Social Sustainability

- To address the issues of social sustainability, our college has formed several dedicated subcommittees—Gender Sensitization Sub-Committee, SC, ST and OBC cell, Minority Cell, Internal Complaints Committee, Anti-ragging Cell and grievance redressal cell.
- The college organizes different programmes and observes the days relevant to these issues by conducting cultural events throughout the year. This includes celebration of Women's Day, Republic Day, Independence Day, birthday of Babasaheb Bhimrao Ambedkar, Swami Vivekananda, Netaji Subhas Chandra Bose, Iswar Chandra Vidyasagar, Rabindranath Tagore, Kazi Nazrul Islam, Pt. Raghunath Murmu and so on.

 To sensitize all our stakeholders about the roles and responsibilities to build a world free from any discriminations, we have organized seminars on the relevant issues. The Gender Sensitization Sub-committee, in collaboration with the IQAC, has invited eminent academicians to enlighten our students on femininity, by conducting an online seminar titles "Figuring Femininity". Another lecture was delivered on "Social Values and Ethics" by Dr. Tapan Kumar De, Professor, department of Philosophy, Vidyasagar University. Social Activist Mrs. Roshenara Khatun has also shared her ordeal in dealing with the challenges posed by our society to women and counselled our students on how to overcome them.

Environmental Sustainability

- We have a very active unit of NSS, consisting of a number of our students and led by Mr. Sandeepan Das, Assistant Professor of Sociology. The unit conducts and organizes several programmes throughout the year that make the students aware of the roles and responsibilities towards environment. They also organize regular tree plantation drives, campaigns against using plastic etc.
- Our institute has declared Thursday of every week to be observed as "No Vehicle Day" to inspire all our stakeholders to do every little bit possible for our environment.
- Our Institution has set up a rain water harvesting system that gathers rooftop rain water via a network of pipes. This water is then directed into a storage tank and the water stored in the tank is used for gardening. In this way water conservation is maintained.
- Our institute has embarked on a Green Campus Initiative and adopted Green Policies to ensure conservation of environment. We also understand that being a higher education institute that houses more than one thousand stakeholders, we have to consume energy responsibly and make necessary amends for the damages caused by the consumption.
